At the time of writing I am preparing the Agenda for the AGM in Derby. As Acting Secretary, since we had to accept Shotgun's reluctant resignation to be a carer, the role has certainly opened my eyes to the demands it makes on one's time to run an Association with around 1000 brethren within 31 Chapters aligned by Association to UGLE & District & Chapters Overseas.

My first hat, since Elected Vice Chair in 2017 at Mold Rugby Club, as Gary Murton wanted to stand down due to pressure of work, was initially an easy ride with Peter taking on the day to day management, but as his thoughts turned to stepping down, he allowed me the opportunity to take a closer look. The two roles have proved time and energy consuming, but the overall experience of working with the members that hold the Association's core values to heart, make it all worthwhile.

What is very clear from my experiences, and looking through the archives on the President's Facebook Page, we do have a sound future, and our contribution to Freemasonry and its charitable pursuits are now considerable. So where do we go from here?

As an organisation growing consistently it also demands we review what we have in place in order to face the challenges that were never envisaged back in 2004 when our first Constitution was adopted. The Constitution review team will be reinvigorated to cover the gaps. Model bylaws created to help new Chapters. Create supporting initiatives to complete the mission "one Chapter per province" for those still to come on board. And of course listening to the members to make sure everyone can connect with our aims and ambitions. Having recently witnessed the collective power to raise funds in a short space of time for a brother in need and recalling our collective effort to support the Lifelites tour around the country back in 2019 am keen to see if we can rise to the challenge to become a Platinum Partner of this very worthy cause.

Clubbing together to make a commitment to Lifelites over four years of \pounds 5,000 each year would make a substantial difference to the life-limited and disabled children that Lifelites support. If every one of the Widows Sons chapters could raise just \pounds 162 each year, then we would be able to hit this target. The cost of a pint per year for each member for four years would hit the target of \pounds 20,000.

A commitment to raise £5,000 each year for Lifelites over the next four years, would enable them to donate an entire batch of equipment to support 200+ life-limited and disabled children using one hospice service. This equipment would assist life-limited children to tell their mum that they love her, perhaps for the first time, to paint, even if they can only move their eyes, and to walk along a virtual beach, even if they are confined to a wheelchair. What say you all, a price of a pint, collectively £20,000? I firmly believe we can do it.

We are now a formidable Association. We can mobilise ourselves at very short notice to support each other's Chapters, support our communities, raise considerable funds for Charity and all the time making it fun. It has to be fun and it must always be fun. Life is too short and we have lost riding buddies and will continue to do so. Therefore make the memories whilst we can and remember we are Freemasons first and have a duty to behave as such.

Finally, we must never lose sight that it is our Freemasonry that brings us together to pursue another passion, our motorcycles. As for the outgoing Chairman, W. Bro. Peter Younger will be a tough act to follow. Over his tenure he has steered us onwards and upwards, shown tremendous commitment to the Association's future and promoted us at every opportunity with our Masonic Rulers. If I may bastardise a quote from Isaac Newton, I will see further because I will stand on the shoulder of giants. Peter is that giant that has given me the altitude to take the Association further with you all along for the Ride.





Chapter Targets & Goals

In our first year as a WSMBA Chapter it was important for us to establish several achievable targets and goals within our community that would provide the basis of our future relationship. The targets considered were, introduction of WSMBA within the local Masonic fraternity, fund raising though members riding events whenever possible and establishing a primary charitable foundation to support going forward.

Supporting local Fraternity

The Gibraltar Masonic Institute is governed and represented by three constitutions (English, Scottish & Irish); it therefore makes it essential that the WSMBA Gibraltar Chapter potentially as members of any of these constitutions can support all three constitutions equally. It is for this reason that the Gibraltar Chapter members have been encouraged, whenever possible, to visit and support all constitutions equally, members have

and will continue attending meetings in which brethren within the Gibraltar Chapter are members of.

At the installation meeting of St. John's Lodge 115 (EC), WSMBA members for the very first time attended a Masonic meeting in Gibraltar and were able to do so in full riding regalia. This was only possible after seeking permission from the District Grand Master R.W. District Grand Master (EC) who has always been very supportive of our association.

The support received from the brethren was simply overwhelming; they simply encouraged us to always wear our regalia in lodge meetings and hoped that we could help in supporting the Freemasonry fraternity in Gibraltar.

First associated member to become a full Master Mason

On Monday 20th September 2021, one of the WSMBA Gibraltar Chapter Cornerstone's was made a full member after receiving his third or sublime degree of a Master Mason. Brother Ryan Castle a member of Lodge St Thomas no 576 (SC).



It was a very special evening as this third degree had been postponed for at least a year due to the Covid-19 Pandemic.

A very good evening represented by many masonic brethren of three constitutions (English, Irish and Scottish) present in Gibraltar, none but not least, an excellent attendance of the WSMBA Gibraltar Chapter members

A total of 7 WSGC members, 4 visiting plus 3 lodge members were able to attend this

meeting but, whilst we would have hoped to have more members, we still faced restrictions (COVID-19) and the decision of the Scottish District to restrict lodge attendance numbers.

Since donations of the Tilt and Touch table began last year it has quickly become a favourite amongst children's hospice staff and the children they care for such as Billie-Marie who you can see is able to enjoy it fully while in her wheelchair and create as much art as she wants.

Lifelites empowers 10,000 life-limited and disabled children and young people using hospice services by providing them with opportunities to benefit from the power of assistive and inclusive technologies to learn, to be creative, to communicate and to take control. There is a Lifelites project in every baby and children's hospice across the British Isles. The hospices do not pay a penny towards their Lifelites project and all of Lifelites' work is funded by donations: the equipment, ongoing technical support and training at each hospice costs around £50,000 over four years.

We have had interest from around 10 potential members in Gloucestershire which takes us another step forward to creating a new Glos Chapter.

We have also had interest from 5 potential members in Bridgwater following a presentation by Harry 'Riff' Blinston.

Widows Sons Presidents AGM - Saturday 26th February 2022

With many members arriving the evening before there was already a buzz amongst those present, and reflected by the numbers mingling around the bar. The following morning the breakfast room again was humming with banter and the numbers swelling as more arrived to make it 26 Chapters represented for the first AGM in a new format after a break forced by the pandemic. Finally everyone was herded into the conference room and Peter Younger opened the proceedings around 10:25. Apologies from Cumbria, Sussex, Norfolk, Guernsey Chapters were recorded. And with the date of the next AGM potentially the 25th February 2023, hopefully that is enough notice for every chapter to be present for the next one. (One thought, shall we fix the AGM for the last Saturday in February?)

The previous minutes from the AGM held Saturday 27th July 2019 held at Lichfield RUFC, Cooke Fields, Tamworth Rd, Lichfield WS14 were circulated and agreed unanimously. There



were no matters arising so we moved onto the agenda. Utilising the screen presentation facility the report was given by Martin Ward with the assistance of Power Point. A clear breakdown of the accounts was shown on the screen, demonstrating that the account mainly supports the BMF membership fees and IT support and design. There was around £1,800 in the account but some fee's due to be allocated soon would reduce the amount of capital at our disposal. Peter then resumed with his report again using





the screen. He was stepping down finally and wished to thank all those involved across the board and membership over the last 12 years for their support. He spoke of the phenomenal growth of the WSMBA and displayed figures on the screen to all brethren present. The slide showed that since 2011 there had been a steady growth of membership and that it now stood at around 1,000 members in the UK and Ireland, plus now had members in Gibraltar and Portugal, all of whom were represented at the meeting. He went on the explain that the



WSMBA was now considered a substantial and respected body with strong and developing international ties. He wanted to see the development of our website to gain the Charter Mark and put the name of the WSMBA at the forefront of Freemasonry. He went on to give thanks to the PGB for their unswerving support and gave special thanks to W. Bro. Ian Gregson for all his hard work over the years. The report was ended with a standing ovation by all those present.



Next up was the almoner, John Perridge, or Grumpy to those that know him better. His full report had been circulated so he just touched on the significant points that he wanted us all to take away, being that there are resources available to almoners and the importance of Care Card. A brief explanation of his role as an MCF Visiting Volunteer was given. On



an emotional note John wished to thank the brethren who had supported him with the fund raising and assistance for "Matty", who had now sadly passed to the Grand Lodge Above. The brethren received his report with the humility and respect It demanded. Thank you Grumpy for all you do for the Association from all of us. Peter now back into the fray with the Election of Chairman & Appointment of PGB Officers (Back Office). In the absence of any other nominations the following were appointed: WSMBA



Chairman Gregory Kirby. In the absence of any other nominations the long-standing Vice Chair and acting secretary was duly elected as the new Chairman. He duly thanked all those present for their support and faith in him as he took the reins. Praise was duly given to the outgoing Chairman and pointed out to the assembled brethren that Peter Younger would be moving to a new and much needed role as Development Executive. Peter Younger was then appointed to that role with responsibility to represent the Association at UGLE, Foreign Lodges, New Chapter Overseer in the event of difficulties. Peter was considered the ideal candidate due to the length of time as Chairman and contacts made during his tenure that will ensure the Association is represented consistently. In quick succession, the following

members were elected to the Back Office of the PGB: Vice Chair Andrew "Baxi" Baxindale; Secretary Gavin Crickett; Treasurer Martin Ward; Almoner John Perridge Overarching Almoner to the WSMBA liaising as and when required at Chapter level; IT/Web Team. Clive Andrews-Lewis, Martin Ward and Richard Webber; News/ Editorial/Media Team Clive Andrews-Lewis & Philip Meynell. Responsible for producing our most successful promotional material to date.

Those in the back office have been allocated the following email addresses and should be used as appropriate: chairman@wsmba. uk; vice-chair@wsmba.uk; secretary@wsmba. uk; treasurer@wsmba.uk; almoner@wsmba. uk; support@wsmba.uk; news@wsmba.uk. In most cases initial contact should be via the Secretary so that a record is kept in one place. The Almoner is obviously for the confidential support. Support will deal with IT web and email forwarding, so every time there is a change of office in your Chapter remember to update Martin with the relevant emails and names, as well as the Secretary. And finally a dedicated easy to remember email for submitting your articles to the Son Editorial team news@wsmba.uk. Remember NO PDFs with embedded photos as that does not work for them. Plain text with photos attached to the email is all they require and any notes if you want a photo in a certain place. They

are good at what they do and will utilise their creative juices to slide it all together! The issues of the Son will also carry their contact details, rules for submitting articles and the deadlines mid-February, May, August and November.

Our Treasurer, now wearing his IT hat, stepped up to give an overview of the IT support available to the WSMBA. He has negotiated a web hosting and email package that ALL Chapters can utilise and this helps to standardise much of what we can do in communicating. For example a web hosting www.surrey.wsmba.uk will also have president@ surrey.wsmba.uk, treasurer@, secretary@ etc. Although they have a site up as www.wssurrey.co.uk, Martin makes everything point to where it should. Another example www.worcs. wsmba.uk is already being hosted without any pointing required and with the supporting email addresses as mentioned above for £10 a year! Those with third party hosting and



email packages are typically paying around £120 a year. Our package is £10 per annum per Chapter with your very own support team, (Martin Ward), that will not leave you waiting in a call queue to assist.

We now have our very own Zoom account with a single login. This will be used for PGB meetings and other national or emergency issues. Usage will be arranged via a shared calendar Team UP. Major benefit PGB quarterly meetings SECOND Sunday March, June, September and December no longer limited to 45 minutes. All Chapters will have access to this account but has to be pre-booked and it was suggested the Team UP app should be used and shared by all.

All the above IT comes at a price and it is anticipated that each Chapter will be levied £15 for the IT element, being the hosting package and Zoom facility above, plus the annual cost of the BMF contribution per capita, in December. BMF Associate membership gives us public liability cover for all WSMBA events.

WSMBA Bank Account: Peter Reed and Mike Haywood are elected as auditors having volunteered, thank you brethren. Martin Ward, Treasurer hat on again, is tasked to locate a second signatory within a reasonable distance to sign cheques, as having second signatories at opposite ends of the UK was not practical. Our finances, including Chapter, must always be overseen by members of the Association, not Associate members or third parties. As one would expect to happen in your lodges.




Chapter Emergency Payments limit £100. Events over the last 2 years have evidenced the need for Presidents to be allowed to make charitable donations at very short notice to worthy causes. Only a month before this meeting a brother was in

serious need of help and Chapters across the UK stepped into the tune of £1200 within days. This change to your bylaws would bring the protocols in line with current procedures within Craft Lodges. So can you check yours and amend if you are agreed. We are also working on model bylaws.

The AGM then broke for refreshments before resuming with the agenda.

Growth. The members were asked to think about Best Practice and ideas for moving the membership forward. It was recognised that great efforts were being made and achieved. There would be opportunity later in the Presidents report to mention some of those ideas.



Retention of WSMBA members. Food for thought! The question was put out there, are we doing enough to make it fun? Are some chapters too rigid in structure and interpretation of the Constitution? Are bylaws easy to comply with and clear? Brethren stated that they had seen members leave over issues and join other Chapters to stay in a Widows Sons. So the Association as a whole is doing something right. Other Chapters mentioned they had moved away from the "Old school" and had an open-door policy to "Bikers" who showed an interest, with a view to the joining Freemasonry in general, our "associate" scheme? Some brethren enquired about the patching ceremony and how they do it. Some give patches at a brother's Raising, some hold special ceremonies to make the event memorable and welcoming to the Fraternal Family. Brother Presidents if you are losing membership are you following up the reasons? This has to be fun and not a chore,





with a degree of flexibility as our lodges now practice.

Returning to the patching of members can we have examples sent in as many Presidents have expressed interest in developing something similar. Maybe a "Patch Edition" of the Son could be circulated?

MRA and how to move forward. Those that wear the Alliance Patch are already aware that we are in Amity with the MRA and those behind the issuing and design of that patch will not Charter in England & Wales. To other flavours of Masonic Bikers, we are always to act professionally and friendly and respect their wishes to be what they are? A number of Brethren expressed their views and it was strongly pointed out that the Scottish WSMRA known as WSS, was not included in the discussion, as they are members of the Alliance and are very much in align with the values and standards of the WSMBA. The subject was raised as "was it possible to hold membership in both camps". It was pointed out that the MBA is the only Biker group recognised by UGLE and is in the Year Book. The MRA it was felt did not uphold the same standards and values and membership was NOT compatible for both versions. The motion of Single membership was Proposed by Peter Younger and Seconded by Alan Doyle and carried unanimously. Hope that makes it clear for everyone now.

Freemasons first then bikers, a reminder.

A reminder to the brethren from the chair our Freemasonry is what unites us. The BoC instructs us how to behave. Our passion for biking has brought us together as the WSMBA. An Association to Masonry. We are held in high esteem by UGLE and the Provinces. Please maintain the high standard expected of us. Masonry is all about making good men better.

Constitution Rewrite/Review. This item appears regularly on the AGM agenda and a team was assembled to get to grips with it. Progress has been slow but with COVID behind us and optimism renewed, plus another volunteer, drafts should be distributed to be ratified at the Rally in July. It was agreed that the members of the Draft Review Team would also look into drafting model bylaws to sit alongside the Constitution.

Limit officers' tenure (if not in constitution). The Chair pointed out that Constitution stipulates 3 years for Presidents. Extension to be ratified by the PGB. Recent experiences suggest this should be adhered to in case a President has overstayed his welcome, giving the membership the opportunity to allow change. It was also mentioned that the agreed term was thought out some years ago and in-line with Masters in The Chair. It was further discussed that some holders were happy in position and their members also happy with the arrangement. All agreed that regular periods of review should take place and confirmation sought as to any continuance of the role. Rotation is also good as it spreads experience and gives other the chance to have a go. Making mistakes should also be treated sympathetically as we are not perfect but are striving to improve the Association and secure its future.

Future Rally arrangements, fine tune the 7 proposed Regions and agree order in which rally will be circulated. The map showing regions was circulated prior and briefly discussed. It was initially assembled based on number of Chapters and membership. Some commented





on the geographical size of some areas and that some Provinces were split from established allies. All Presidents would again be provided with a copy displaying the regions for feedback. The regions being agreed and officially formed primarily for admin and possible disputes but also for hosting Rallies. If each chapter held a National Rally, it could take 30 odd years to get to hold one! Plus, many hands making light work, shares the burden and associated costs of putting one on amongst several chapters. Those that have held rallies am sure would lend their expertise and Peter Younger is keen to build up inventory for the Association to use wherever needed. Maybe one day our own Rally Van suitably painted? The Widows Sons Rally Bus, and by day a bike recovery service? Peter also suggested that the Rallies should concentrate on fun, (that word again), and not raising funds as that is an activity going on all the time.

Agree any additional WSMBA management that can be handled at Regional level rather than by the PGB as a whole. The Chair commented that at the moment complaints are being handled by the Secretary and Vice chair. To provide a better service it is suggested that the Vice Chair can delegate a team of PGB members to assist the Secretary to deal locally to resolve. The Region Map becomes more relevant and does



need to be agreed ASAP as more Chapters are formed. This will make administration more effective and matters/issues that need to be raised by a Chapter could be dealt with quickly on a Region/Local basis rather than National. Final decisions should always fall to the full PGB, if the complaints or issues were not resolved by Region, for final decision making. This was



agreed by the brethren and passed accordingly. A lot of physical ground to cover now so a Vice Chair for the South to share the workload with Baxi?

Major events such as chapter rally's as well as WSMBA National Rally. Calendar sharing - Many chapters in the past have asked and talked about sharing events. This has been researched by the IT Team and now recommend the free version of Team Up for each chapter. Martin Ward, explained how this would work and would send out more detailed information to those interested. Stop Press: The account is now up and running and volunteers are starting to populate the calendar. Just email in your events, biker related masonic meetings, bike shows, etc. Do send in as much detail as possible. Jamie Osborne has volunteered to maintain the TeamUp Calendar so send what you have to Jamie.osborn@hotmail.com

Luncheon was then taken! And for those in first am sure it was splendid. The tail had to wait for top ups and frozen onion bhajis that were harder than cricket balls. Grumpy has fed back the comments and should we use the venue in 2023 am sure they will improve the service. The staff have certainly been excellent to deal with and kind to us at all times.

WSMBA social media presence. Websites, Instagram, Twitter, Facebook. WSMBA has a presence now on all social media platforms. The IT Team and Jamie "Ozzy" Osborn have been running the media content. Our part to play is to make sure anything posted is within the bounds expected of us by the social media guidelines published by UGLE. Do not get involved in slanging matches as screen shots are very easy to grab. We must always maintain the moral high ground. If in doubt say nought. If you can't say anything nice, say nothing. Jamie explained to the brethren how he has been using Twitter to



promote the activity within his Province and was happy to be Point of Contact to anyone needing coaching in this area. He has recently used the Stonecutters Biker Down experience to good effect on Twitter and that has been pushed on by DocBike as another positive commentary for Masonry.

The Presidents in alphabetical order then presented their reports, with a couple of exceptions from our newer members, kept within the three-minute rule. In summary, all is well and growth, despite the restraints imposed by Covid-19 has been steady for some and rapid for others. We, like the rest of the UK, were restablishing old routines and getting out more amongst the communities. Promoting good deeds and causes and showing the face of Freemasonry to the general public. Some good ideas raised and taken away. Membership to MBA up, membership to Freemasonry up and positive feelings up!! Takes aways included: Breakfast Runs, Natter Nights, Light Blues Clubs, Presidents Ball in each Region for Lifelites Appeal.

The last one brings us nicely onto a good cause that we can all get behind as one Association. Lifelites. Their mission statement is: To enrich the lives of children and young people with life-limiting and life-threatening conditions in children's hospices by providing them with the latest assistive and inclusive technologies relevant to their needs and abilities and to support them with maintenance and training, all free of charge. Free of charge to the Hospices maybe, but they have to source the funds to keep up their good work. Lifelites appreciate the support they get from some of us already and their visit around the Provinces year before last was well supported by the WSMBA. That drive around the Provinces was aimed at the PGMs and they in turn are taking up the gauntlet to become a Lifelites Platinum Partner.

How good would that be for us to also join the ranks of a Province as one too? To qualify we need to pledge to raise £20,000 over four years. £5000 per annum divided by 30 Chapters is £167 a year. Per current membership that equates to £5.25 per annum for four years. A pint of beer in some pubs in London is £5.35! I believe this is achievable and already some of you have pitched ideas how to hit target. If we go for it Lifelites will let everyone know we are on board. Can I count on your support? Full details will be published in the "Son" spring edition.

The Agenda now over it just remained to thank the organisers of the event and to the staff at the hotel. All agreed that it had been a vast improvement on past activities and will allow the PGB to enjoy the National Rally.

And finally, thanks were again given to Peter Younger for his outstanding Leadership over the past 12 years.


