If you had one positive message, what would it be: Be caring and always true to yourself.

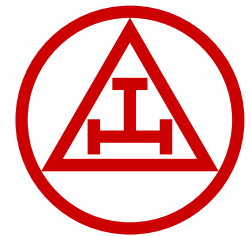

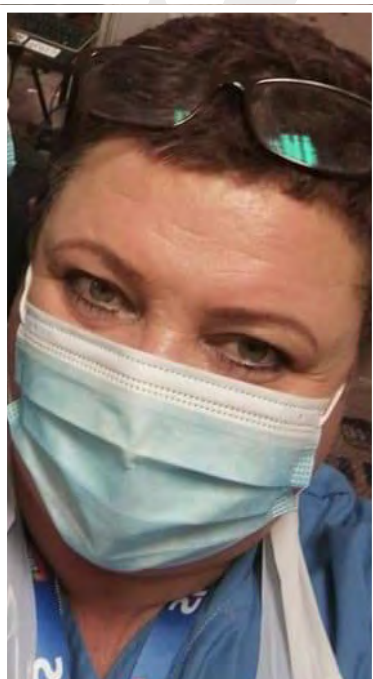

Constitutional Royal Arch Chapter No. 55

Constitutional Chapter No. 55 had resisted handing its charter back three times. No candidates for 17 years and a dwindling membership signalled the inevitable. A sad end for a chapter consecrated in 1874. E. Comp Michael Longley was the most vocal in fighting to stay on the register, flying down from Scotland to the meetings to voice his objections to handing back the charter. Their plight came to the attention of the Widows Sons Masonic Bikers Association who were keen to start a Holy Royal Arch Chapter in the Metropolitan area as a continuance of their masonry and biking enthusiasm. As no new chapters are being consecrated in our area, we had to look for a failing chapter that would be happy to be taken over. A quick decision was made by the old guard, represented by E. Comp John Thurley and E. Comp Norman Branson and the newbies represented by E. Comp Gregory Kirby and Companion Gavin Crickett, to embrace this initiative and a group of Widows Sons joined last September to swell their ranks from 12 to 23 full members in one meeting. Gavin had been tipped off by E. Comp Nick Jenkins, the chapter Visiting Officer, to reach out. We believe he is delighted we did too.



At the Installation meeting in February the offices of the **Constitutional Chapter No. 55** were filled by the joining members from the Widows Sons MBA. Roll on to the April meeting, we faced our first ceremony with trepidation. The first Exaltation for 17 years and two days to go we had no DC and a very inexperienced PS, so needed some support. Step up E. Comp Steve Hyland of the recently formed Metropolitan Royal Arch Emergency Ritual Team who managed within 48 hours to produce two volunteers: E. Comp Jeff Hough and E. Comp Wayne Hirst. Jeff quickly took control of proceedings as acting DC, and Wayne rolled his sleeves up to the role of PS. With no opportunity of a regular COI, nor the opportunity to rehearse prior, we set off as a "team" to Exalt Bro Daniel Swain. It was obvious from the start that the ceremony was going well. No books, no prompts, just everyone dropping into their respective roles to deliver a first-class ceremony for Brother Dan. Yes, we swapped roles around to deliver the ritual, drawing on the experience where required, and then resumed our respective offices to close. A strategy we intend to encourage so as to give opportunity for party pieces to be delivered by enthusiastic members. We also intend to draw on the option of splitting up large chunks of Domestic ritual to help the newer members balance their family life and livelihoods with their masonic commitments.

The festive board banter is where the merger of the old guard and the newbies came to the fore. It is often said that mergers don't work as the original members don't bond with the newbies. Nothing could be further from the truth as witnessed at the Freemasons Arms that night. Both sides offering ideas and suggestions on the way forward, including plotting to support the Constitutional Lodge Ladies Night as well, in order to reach out to them that they now have a chapter to be proud of, pledging two tables of ten. Brother Dan, now a companion, at his response to his toast commented how well he felt everything went, despite not having a clue what was going on, but was truly grateful for the experience and effort of the Companions involved. The common glue was the love of motorcycles shared by riders and non-riders alike, swapping anecdotes and reliving memories. For the first time in a long time, I for one wished the evening didn't have to end.

During the course of the festive board, E. Comp Jeff studied the summons and realised that we did not have a DC at all. He thought he was just helping out. His realisation soon turned to " I am now



your DC where is a form?" How good was that. Masonic protocol during the festive board was followed with due respect, but in between the camaraderie came through in spades. Raffles and alms collections have now been reintroduced so we can play our part in the great scheme of Masonic giving.

From teetering on the edge of extinction, the Chapter is now busy with a double Exaltation in September and two candidates in the

pipeline for April 2020 already scheduled. Our regular meetings are held on the fourth Friday in February (Installation), April and September in each year. We don't intend to rest on our laurels and would welcome Companions that want to be in a dynamic Chapter under Metropolitan Grand Chapter, that delivers its ritual, and balances life, laughter, love of motorcycles to ensure masonry is fun.

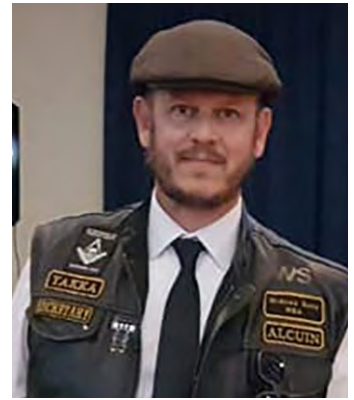


Ridings Chapter Roundup

The “Knowledge”

A series of occasional riding tips...

This month from Michael “Gunny” O’Meara

Fit to Ride? Keeping your bike safe doesn't always mean major surgery. A quick pre-ride check every day will help keep you safe and may avoid the need for expensive repair bills. To make sure you don't miss anything, use the following mnemonic:

P.O.W.D.D.E.R.S.S

- Petrol - Is there enough for the journey?
- Oil - Check the oil to make sure it's at the correct level (check the other fluids brake/clutch etc)
- Water - Check the level if you have a water cooled bike.
- Damage/Drive –Do a visual check of the chain and lube if required. Shaft drive – check for leaks
- Electrics – Check the lights, indicators, and hazards if fitted
- Rubber - Check the tyres, wheels, throttle grip, footrest rubbers etc are all in good working order
- Steering/Suspension - Make sure everything is working smoothly, check the dampers are working, check the brake levers and their action

If the bike is ready to go, don't forget to check your kit, helmet and visor too.

The list is by no means exhaustive, but should be carried out regularly and especially before long rides. Last but by no means least consider a final **S** for 'Self'. Ask yourself: am I fit to ride? We all too often only concern ourselves with our bike and sometimes neglect to think about ourselves.

I.A.M.S.A.F.E.

- Illness - Do I have an illness or symptoms that might affect my ability to drive?
- Attitude - How do I feel about this journey? Am I fully focussed on the driving task? What human factors do I need to take account of?
- Medication - Am I taking any medication that might affect my performance?
- Sleep - Am I suffering from lack of sleep / fatigue?
- Alcohol - Have I had a drink? Am I still affected by alcohol?
- Food - Am I hungry or thirsty? Could low blood sugar or dehydration affect my judgement
- Emotion - Am I angry, depressed or stressed? Could this lead me to take risks?

So what makes a good rider?

- Critical and honest self-awareness and understanding of your personal characteristics, attitudes and behaviour, which are necessary for safe driving
- Taking action to keep identified risks to a minimum
- Awareness of your own limitations and those of the vehicle and the road
- Awareness of the risks inherent in a particular road and traffic situations
- Concentration and good observation
- Continuously matching the vehicle's direction and speed to the changing conditions
- Skillful use of vehicle controls

The way you ride and conduct yourself on the road positively influences reciprocal behaviour from other motorists.

For example, a raised hand to thank someone for letting you pass or to apologise for making an error significantly reduces any ill will and increases a co-operative 'Flow' of traffic.

Take a 'Big Picture' view to reduce any feelings which can arise from the idea that your journey is in some way a priority

Your vulnerability as a Rider

Most Riders think they are both safer and more skillful than the average driver - but we cannot all be right. In 2 out of 3 collisions human error is a cause. Riding safely is not an add-on extra - it must be built into the way you ride.

What are the commonest causes of collisions?

The commonest recorded causes of collisions in the UK are:

- Driver error or reaction - this is a factor in 2 out of 3 collisions. The commonest errors are:
- Failure to look properly
- Failure to judge the other person's path or speed
- Loss of control

Action based on poor judgement - this contributes to just over a quarter of all collisions. The main factors are:

- Travelling too fast for the conditions
- Exceeding the speed limit
- Following too close

Being careless, reckless or in a hurry - is the next most common factor, contributing to around 1 in 6 collisions

Critical learning from experience

To become a better driver the first step is to recognise the resistance in ourselves to accepting responsibility. The second step is to accept every near miss and collision as a learning opportunity to decide how you can avoid the same mistake in the future.

It is irrelevant whether you believe another motorist is at fault - ASK 'What can I do differently?'

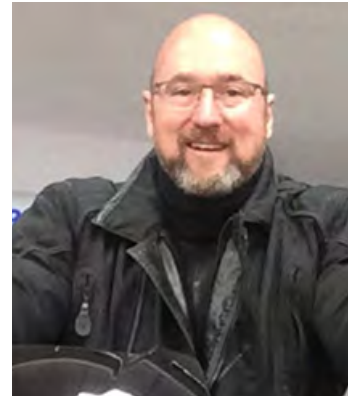


lottery, we keep the numbers looking healthy!

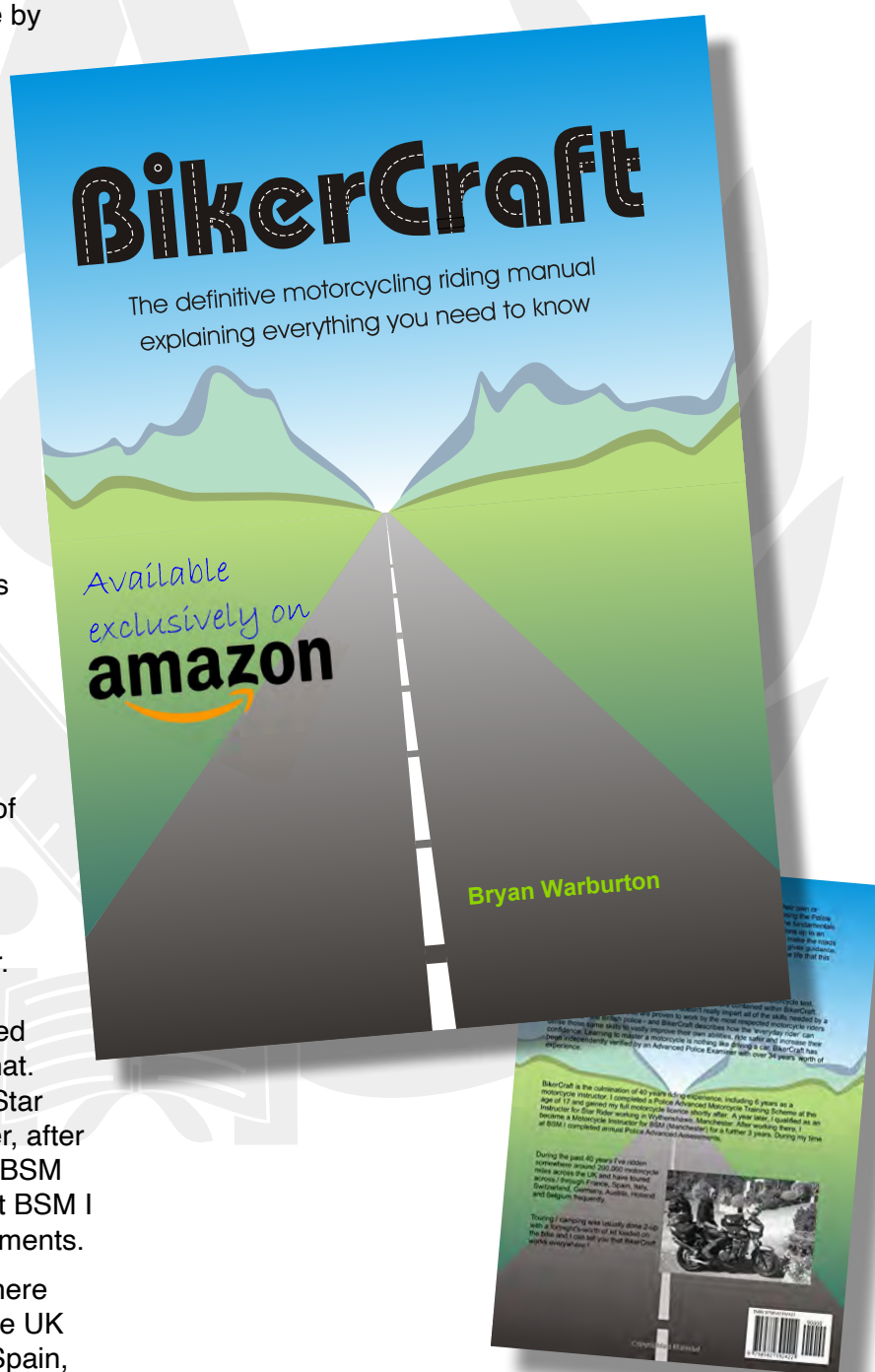
Over the past 40 years I've ridden somewhere around 200,000 motorcycle miles across the UK and have toured across / through France, Spain,
