

#### **West Kent Chapter Roundup**

On Saturday the 4th of December, members of West Kent took part in their annual Toy Run dressed as Santa's and an Elf, to help disadvantaged children and families across the Bourgh of Bromley. A total of £3,000 was raised by donations across the province and this was topped up by £600 from the Entertainer Toy Store. The till receipt was over 2.5 metre long!!

Daniel J Spencer, Assistant Provincial Grand Master in West Kent said, "I've just spent the last couple of hours at 'Community House' in Bromley, representing the Province and supporting the 'Widows Sons' at the start of this years 'Toy Run'. The Bromley Children and Families Forum (who distributed to 20 local charities specifically looking after disadvantaged and disabled children) were blown away by our member's generosity and the hall here was packed full with presents that will be distributed this Christmas."

Departing from The Triumph Factory Visitor Experience, Hinckley, participants took off for a 37-mile route ride, accompanied by an escort from Leicestershire Police complete with flashing lights and Police Outriders. We were delighted to also be joined by members of The British Army Motorcycle Road Race Team, Fire Service, who provided first responder assistance; Biker Down UK; and Leicestershire and Rutland Blood Bikes. This event raised a fantastic £5500 for the Army family.

At the end of September Beda were approached to surprise Zach with a ride to his house. Zach is a 4 year old with cystic fibrosis and loves anything with an engine! Beda arrived outside his house where he sat on the bikes, revving them to



the red line. Before leaving, he was made an honorary member being presented with a 'Cut' (a leather waistcoat) and a TLC Teddy.

Come the first Saturday in October some members took their annual pilgrimage to the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire for the Ride to The Wall. It





was a very wet day, it even rained for the service, a first! It was great to catch up with the other chapters and we are looking forward to it next year, hopefully the gear has dried off by then!

Clanger Goulash (aka Stuart Prouse) started running at the end of lockdown 1, completing the Couch to 5k program. If we look back and learn from the history and heritage from the 20th century (1990) formation of the Portuguese Masonic Lodges and its relationship with the Gibraltarian Mason Lodges, you will realise the depth of the Brotherhood's common values, understanding and working relationships that have led to the parallel 21st century bonding and support provided by the Widows Sons Mason Bikers Association Gibraltar Chapter to the formation of the Portuguese Chapter.

The WSGC were kindly invited to the Portuguese Founders Inauguration Meeting in Tomar. A city chosen for its deep historical significance as the Portuguese Capital of the Knights Templars, and therefore its links with Masonry and our Brethren.

**Day 1:** The Gibraltar Chapter left in two waves; three of us has to leave early for Cadiz and the remaining four joined us late morning. A brilliant ride in great weather, no issues, at a reasonable clip, and straight to Faro for our first night stop-over.

We were entertained by a local Brother Archim Müller who lavished us with his chosen wine (and high alcohol content digestifs!) in a well visited local restaurant. An excellent and very late evening of brotherly camaraderie and laughter.



Day 2: We were kindly picked up at the hotel at noon by a few of the Portuguese Chapter and greeted with a box of Pastel de nata! How kind. A very long riding day of three halves ... We rode along half of the famous N2! 

She continued "Felicity has been looking forward to her prom as she feels that this will be the point where she can show them (the bullies) that they can't hurt her anymore."

The Worcestershire Chapter of the Widows Sons (the Masonic Bikers Association, WSMBA) took up the challenge and agreed to take part and help marshal the event — and unbelievably, what actually took place was that over 250 bikes turned up! Just getting off the car park in Droitwich took



over half an hour, explained WBro Andy Philpott, President of the Worcester WSMBA, and the route took them on a tour of Droitwich and surrounding area and onto The Rugby Club - to see the look on Felicity's face, and her family's, just showed how proud we were of all the bikers that took part, he said. Her father quoted "Proud of her doesn't even touch it, she's an amazing girl and she hasn't deserved any of this, so to see her light up like a Christmas tree was absolutely fantastic".

A fantastic route around south Devon, with a photo shoot at the Churchill tank on Slapton Sands.






#### **Southern Chapter Roundup**


## Pilgrims Chapter Roundup Robs Run....
